Dues Increases Coming?

Presently the International Dues are \$39 US annually paid in July and January. At this year's International convention in Seattle they are asking the delegates to increase it \$4US over 2 years. That means if it passes Int. Dues will be \$41 US July 1, 2012 and \$43US July 1, 2013.

The Multiple District 37 dues are presently \$11 US paid in January. At the Medicine Hat MD 37 Convention this year the delegates are being asked to raise the dues by \$3US.

That means in July will be probably paying the MD dues of \$14 plus our District dues of \$5.70US. In 2012-2013 the increase in dues will mean \$41US Int. Dues plus District and MD dues at \$19.70 US for a total of \$60.70 US. If these dues increases pass you may have to raise your club dues accordingly. In the year 2013-14 the total dues will be \$62.70US.

None of the above figures include the exchange rate.

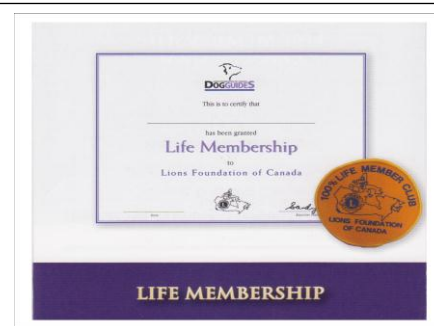

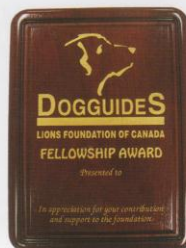

These past months have brought challenges to areas on a scale they have never experienced. Lives have been forever changed following devastating events that only took moments and gave no warning. Computers and television sets have been filled with stories and pictures of struggle and devastation. However, along with these tragic accounts have come stories of compassion and hope. The Lions of New Zealand and Japan are providing some of those stories through their service and from the financial support provided by LCIF – your Foundation.

Japanese Lions are already hard at work, having established four relief depots in the affected areas, as well as a central command center at the Lions office in Tokyo. Lions throughout Japan are transporting goods including baby milk, rice, water and diapers. They are working with the Red Cross to meet the most pressing needs, including holding blood drives. Lions in Kobe are helping lead these relief efforts, utilizing their expertise in earthquake relief and recovery from the 1994 disaster. These are just a few examples of the many stories of Lions' exemplary service.

This past year, Lions worldwide have responded to the needs of both disaster stricken areas and tranquil communities at an increasing rate. Overall donations to LCIF are ahead of this same period last year. Individuals, clubs, districts and multiple districts have responded in significant ways and Lions are implementing the LCIF supported programs throughout the world - but there is still much more to do.

The LCIF Executive Committee members approved giving Melvin Jones Fellowship credit for designated Japan Relief donations received prior to June 30, 2011. This allowance is rarely exercised by the committee and demonstrates the tremendous needs of those in the affected area. If you are planning to make a donation to LCIF for Japan Relief or to the general fund, please send in your donations today. It can take up to four weeks to ship MJF plaques during a busy convention season, so please keep that in mind if you are planning to make an end of fiscal year gift.

A Melvin Jones Fellowship recognizes donations of US\$1,000 to LCIF. This prestigious recognition of humanitarian work is one of several offered by the Foundation. Other programs also recognize individual Lions, as well as clubs and districts. A few examples include:

- ☐ Melvin Jones Fellowship: US\$1,000 undesignated donation (Japan Relief until June 30, 2011)
- ☐ Contributing Member: A US\$20, US\$50 or US\$100 undesignated donation by an individual donor and identified for Contributing Member program (does not qualify for MJF credit too)

- ☐ 100% MJF Club Banner: Every member of a club is a Melvin Jones Fellow
- ☐ District Certificate of Appreciation: Every club donates to LCIF during the fiscal year

At the January Lions Humanitarian of the Year MJF dinner in District 23C, Past International President Jimmy Ross stated that giving is "...one of the most powerful things in the world. When you give unconditionally, it will come back to you ten-fold." If you or your club is close to a US\$1,000 donation, consider using the remaining funds to qualify for a MJF and recognize a worthy recipient. 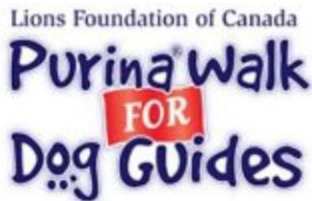
Your Password - You will be able to register for your own password

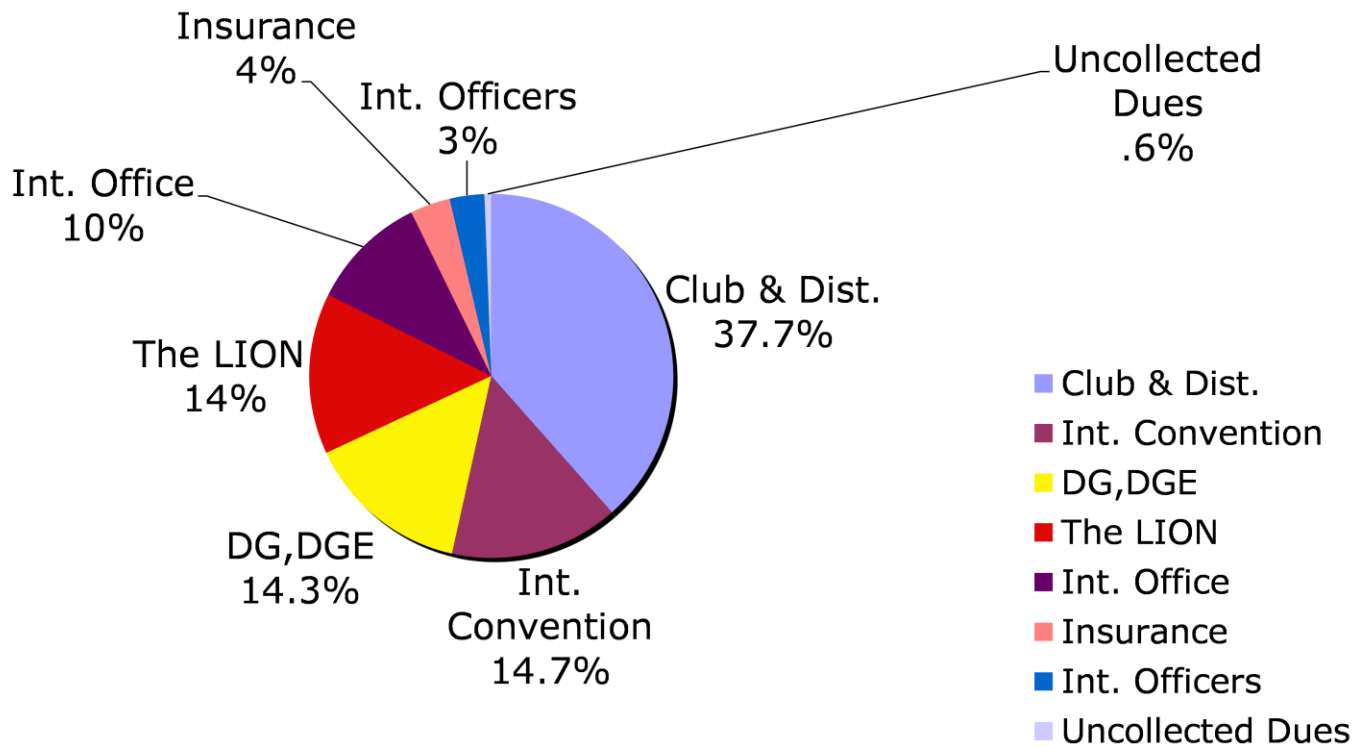

Comments on 20 years of Club Delegates Voting at District 37-0 Conventions

PDG's and the present District Governor have separate votes above the club's allotment.

The 4 clubs that have had 100 per cent of their delegates voting for the 20 year summary are: Mountainview, North Hill, South Asian and Chestermere. Congratulations especially to North Hill who is a large club and has voted with their full delegation for 20 years. It is true that many of these clubs are fairly new clubs.

Others have come close from 80% to 99%: Heritage 98, North East Eyeopener 97, Properties 95, Southridge 95, Wildrose 95, Woodcreek 95, Ft. Calgary 92, Filipino 90, Chinatown 87, Korean 87, Lions Club of Calgary 85 and Strathmore 80%.

Ones from 60% to 79% voting are: Eastport 78, Airdrie 75, Carseland 74, Bowness 72, Canmore 69, Bearspaw 68, Cochrane 67, Irricana 67, Olds 68 and Milo with 62%.

The ones above 50% voting are: Carstairs 59, Cremona 57, Highwood 56, Okotoks 55, Nanton 53 and Beiseker 52%.

The remaining clubs are below the 50% level of voting. One club has never voted once in the 20 years.

How about the PDG voting pattern for the past 20 years also? 52% (15 out of a possible 29) have exercised their right to vote at every convention. . Another 20% range from 75% to 99% voting. Five older PDG's have not voted in the past 20 years. For all of those new Lions and not so new

1917...Although Montana had no Lions clubs at the time it was included with Wyoming and was called District 3 (one of the nine districts in the USA)

1921...all of the USA was redistricted. Wyoming and Montana became District 15. Billing Lions Club was chartered in 1921.

1926...Montana was separated from Wyoming and was designated the 37th District of Lions International. After the separation of Wyoming and Montana Billings Lions would become the first club in MD37.

(Julius Wuerthner was District Governor for District 37 in 1926-27)

1929...The Lions Club of Calgary and the Edmonton Host Lions club were formed.

1930...Now International Director Julius Wuerthner recommended that Alberta become a permanent part of District 37 and on July 1, 1931 Alberta was added to Montana and became a part of District 37.

1942...Two District Governors (James Wallace of Edmonton, Alberta and Stuart DesRosier of Browning, Montana) were elected to serve District 37...this was the start of Multiple District 37.

1946-47...MD 37 had three sub districts... A, B, & C.

1948-49...MD 37 had four sub districts...A, B, C, & D.

1959-60...MD 37 had five sub districts...A, B, C, D, & E

1966-67...MD 37 had six sub districts...A, B, C, D, E, & F.

1976-77...MD 37 had eight sub districts...A, B, C, D, E, F, G & H

1987-88...MD 37 redistricted seven sub districts...A, B, C, D, E, F, & G

2004.....MD37 redistricted to five districts, L, I, O, N, & S
